## **Experimentation in buying decent work:**

## Transforming public procurement policies and practice

The European Commission's current plans to revise the European Procurement Directives provide a valuable opportunity to review the progress made and the remaining challenges in making public procurement more socially sustainable. The 2014 revision of the Directives has supported EU member states in moving away from 'buying cheap' (lowest price purchasing practices) and towards 'buying decent work' (introducing safeguards to secure labour standards in publicly contracted firms). However, these efforts are still hindered by legal uncertainties due to competition law restrictions, financial constraints and debt reduction targets, as well as entrenched routines and cognitive frameworks among public purchasers. This conference presents findings from several recently concluded research projects (published in Transfer 2/2025), which studied novel approaches in EU member states to reorient public procurement towards 'buying decent work'. The presentations will highlight the challenges, trial-and-error processes ('experimentation') and learning processes of public authorities and social partners in dealing with these challenges, thereby providing a rich basis for joint reflection on the policy changes needed at EU and national levels.
